

Founded when and by whom?

1517: Martin Luther challenges Catholic teachings with his Ninety-five Theses. 1530: the Augsburg Confession is published.

Adherents in 2000?

About 60 million worldwide; about 9 million U.S.

How is Scripture viewed?

Protestant canon contains 39 OT books, 27 NT. Scripture alone is the authoritative witness to the gospel.

How are we saved?

We are saved by grace when God grants righteousness through faith alone. Good works inevitably result, but they are not the basis of salvation.

What is the church?

The congregation of believers, mixed with the lost, in which the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered.

What about the sacraments?

Baptism is necessary for salvation. The Lord's Supper is bread & wine that, with God's Word are truly Jesus' body & blood.

Catholic

Catholics consider Jesus' disciple Peter (died ca. A.D. 66) the first pope. Through Gregory the Great (540-604), papacy is firmly established.

About 1 billion worldwide; 60 million U.S.

The canon is 46 books in the OT (Apocryhpha included) and 27 in the NT. Interpretation is subject to church tradition.

God infuses the gift of faith in the baptized, which is maintained by good works and receiving Penance and the Eucharist.

The mystical body of Christ, who established it with the pope as its head; he pronounces doctrine in communion with all bishops.

Catholics hold seven sacraments. Baptism removes original sin; usually infants. The Eucharist undergoes transubstantiation.

Orthodox

A.D 330: Emperor Constantine renames Byzantium "Constantinople" and declares Christianity the empire's religion.

About 225 million worldwide; about 4 million U.S.

49 OT books (Catholic plus three more) and 27 NT. Scripture is subject to tradition.

God became human so humans could be deified, that is, have the energy of God's life in them.

The body of Christ in unbroken historical connection with the apostles; the Roman pope is one of many patriarchs who govern.

Baptism initiates God's life in the baptized; adults and children. In the Eucharist, bread & wine are changed into body & blood.

COMPARATIVE DENOMINATIONS:

Anabaptist

Founded when and by whom?

1523: Protestants in Zurich, Switzerland, begin believers' baptism. 1537: Menno Simons begins Mennonite movement.

Adherents in 2000?

About 2 million worldwide; about 600,000 U.S.

How is Scripture viewed?

Protestant canon accepted. Scripture is inspired but not infallible. Jesus is living Word; Scripture is written Word.

How are we saved?

Salvation is a personal experience. Through faith in Jesus, we become at peace with God, moving us to follow Jesus' example by being peacemakers.

What is the church?

The body of Christ, the assembly and society of believers. No one system of government is recognized.

What about the sacraments?

Baptism is for believers only. The Lord's Supper is a memorial of his death.

Congregational

1607: Members of England's illegal "house church" exiled. 1620: Congregationalists arrive in the New World on the Mayflower.

More than 2 million worldwide; about 2 million U.S.

Protestant canon accepted. Bible is the authoritative witness to the Word of God.

God promises forgiveness and grace to save "from sin and aimlessness" all who trust him, who accept his call to serve the whole human family.

The people of God living as Jesus' disciples. Each local church is self-governing and chooses its own ministers.

Congregations may practice infant baptism or believers' baptism or both. Sacraments are symbols.

Baptist

1612: John Smythe and other Puritans form the first Baptist church. 1639: The first Baptist church in America is established.

100 million worldwide; about 30 million U.S.

Protestant canon accepted. Scripture is inspired and without error; the sole rule of faith.

Salvation is offered freely to all who accept Jesus as Saviour. There is no salvation apart from personal faith in Christ.

The body of Christ; the redeemed throughout history. The term *church* usually refers to local congregations, which are autonomous.

Baptism is immersion of believers, only as a symbol.
The Lord's Supper is symbolic.

Non-Liturgical Churches

Founded when and by whom?

Churches of Christ 1801: Barton Stone holds Cane Ridge Revival in Kentucky. 1832: Stone's Christians unite with Disciples of Christ.

Adherents in 2000?

5-6 million worldwide; about 3 million U.S.

How is Scripture viewed?

Protestant canon accepted. Scripture is the Word of God. Disciples of Christ view it as a witness to Christ, but fallible.

How are we saved?

We must hear the gospel, repent, confess Christ, and be baptized. Disciples of Christ: God saves people by grace.

What is the church?

The assembly of those who have responded rightly to the gospel; it must be called only by the name of Christ.

What about the sacraments?

Baptism is the immersion of believers only, as the initial act of obedience to the gospel. The Lord's Supper is a symbolic memorial.

Adventist

1844: William
Miller's prediction
of Christ's return
that year failed.
1863: Seventh-Day
Adventist Church
is organized.

About 11 million worldwide; about 100,000 U.S.

Protestant canon accepted. Scripture is inspired and without error; Ellen G. White, an early leader, was a prophet.

We repent by believing in Christ as Example (in his life) and Substitute (by his death). Those who are found right with God will be saved.

Includes all who believe in Christ. The last days are a time of apostasy, when a remnant keeps God's commandments faithfully.

Baptism is the immersion of believers only. Baptism and the Lord's Supper are symbolic only.

Pentecostal

1901: Kansas college students speak in tongues. 1906: Azusa Street revival in L.A. launches movement. 1914: Assemblies of God organized.

About 500 million worldwide; about 5 million U.S.

Protestant canon accepted. Scripture is inspired and without error. Some leaders are considered prophets.

We are saved by God's grace through Jesus, resulting in our being born again in the Spirit, as evidenced by a life of holiness.

The body of Christ, in which the Holy Spirit dwells; the agency for bringing the gospel of salvation to the whole world.

Baptism is immersion of believers only. A further "baptism in the Holy Spirit" is offered. Lord's Supper is symbolic.

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
