Next Sunday Dec 31, 10:00am "Letting Go and New Beginnings" by Rev. Ralph Tyksinski

In this New Year's Eve service we will be taking a final glimpse of the past year, and reconnect with all that it has meant for us. We invite you to take a piece of paper and reflect on the calendar year, 2023, that we are leaving, by considering what you might wish to leave behind. What parts of our lives - what things, ideas, people, ways of living - have become obstacles to our becoming the person/people you/we want to be, the person/people you/we need to be? What's holding you/us back? What's getting in the way of you/we living as fully as you/we would like to be/become? What might be burned away? What should be let go? You can also write a word or two that represents a New Year's "resolution", something to be hoped for in 2024. Nobody will see it except you, and the flame (the flame will be burning outside and where we will be concluding the service). By Letting Go we are better prepared to enter the New Year seeking New Beginnings boldly, with curiosity, compassion, and courage.
